



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. We proclaim his resurrection. We await his coming in glory;


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

The Breaking of the Bread

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!*

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.



THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

For today's Anthem at the Offertory the choir sings a traditional *Hora*, a Jewish dance song, to the text "God has spoken to his people" – a reminder that God's gifts to us are boundless and that we must respond with our own gifts to Him. At the autumn festival of Simchas Torah observant Jews dance with the Torah scrolls (our books of Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy) to celebrate the gift of God's word. As we sing Torah ora (The Law is our Light) let

us do so with exuberance in our gratitude for all we are given.

Our musical guest this morning is Dr. Keith Koons, principal clarinet for the Brevard Symphony Orchestra. Using Dr. D's arrangement he adds a distinctive klezmer flavor to the Offertory Anthem. The Yiddish word klezmer is defined in the Merriam -Webster Dictionary as, "A Jewish instrumentalist especially of traditional eastern European music." In Eastern Europe, during the days before the Internet, television, radio, or any mass communications, people would congregate in their villages in the evenings to socialize. They would tell stories, sing and play music, dance, and pass family histories down from generation to generation. If there was any formal education, it was guided by religious leaders and the village elders. Music and musical training were done through listening to the musicians in the village, and the music they performed was strongly influenced by their religious and national origins, as well as the style and inflection of their language. Klezmer musicians would entertain in their villages and also perform ceremonial music for weddings, Bar Mitzvahs, and other celebratory occasions. There are a number of special extended techniques used by klezmer clarinetists and these techniques are essential to capture the authentic klezmer style. This list includes glissandi, note bends, growling, and imitating the inflections of the human voice. If you've ever seen Fiddler on the Roof you will remember the wedding scenes, which feature klezmer at its most exhuberant.

Our closing hymn "O love of God, how strong and true" was first found in Hymns of Faith and Hope of 1861 and the author is Horatio Bonar (1808-1889). The love of God lies at the heart of the Christian message, and that love is not an abstract idea but an act of redemption. William Temple points out that the essence of Christianity is not "God is love" but "God so loved that he gave," and this love is the theme of the great Scottish writer's hymn. (from *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace) The tune, DETAR, is named for Vernon DeTar, for many years the organ teacher at the Juilliard school and Union Theological Seminary and distinguished organist and choirmaster at New York's Church of the Ascension – and, incidentally, Dr. Davidson's organ teacher, is a "new" tune to our present hymnal and one that we hope will become more and more familiar to us.


