




Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4

The oracle that the prophet Habakkuk saw. O Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you "Violence!" and you will not save? 
It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth through

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh,

We await his coming in glory;


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

The Breaking of the Bread

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!*

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Many thanks go to those of you who have heeded the request for quiet before the service begins. First, it is the proper, traditional thing to do. Second, when we have visitors it is their first experience in the parish, and those who are seeking a traditional Episcopal experience are frequently turned off by a less-than-contemplative service beginning. The organ voluntary should be an "air lock" that moves us out of our daily world and into a world where we may hear God's voice.

The choir sings a translation by Allen W. Chatfield (c.1876) of a hymn by Synesius of Cyrene (c.430) Synesius forms his text from Psalms 51 and 119, Hebrews 4, Luke 23, and Matthew 5. The tune, SOUTHWELL comes from William Daman's Psalter, 1579.

"Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven" was written by Henry Lyte (1793-1847) and first appeared in *Spirit of the Psalms* of 1835. While earlier hymnodists made paraphrases of hymns, Lyte, who won the prize for poetry three years in a row at Trinity College, Dublin, added a new dimension by making them poetical interpretations. This version of Psalm 103 includes such memorable lines as "Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven," and "Father-like he tends and spares us." Unfortunately the stanza based on verses 15-17 beginning "Frail as summer's flower we flourish, Blows the wind, and it is gone" is omitted from our hymnal. (From *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)
