The organ voluntary is an opportunity when, if we are properly prepared, we may hear the voice of the Holy Spirit in the confines of our mind.



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drinkit, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!*

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.


The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.







THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Happy New Year! We should be singing "Auld Lang Syne" and wearing funny hats as today is the first day of the church's new year. This next year, using the readings specified for Cycle A in the *New Revised Common Lectionary*, we will once again tell the story of the advent, birth, life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Today also begins the season of Advent, the four Sundays prior to Christmas, a time of preparation and waiting. Notice how all our liturgy and music point up these themes, saving Christmas images until the Christmas season begins on Christmas Eve.

Following an ancient custom, we have the organ remain relatively silent during the season of Advent. This gives our ears a chance to rest and helps make it fresh again when it sounds in all its majesty at the Christmas Eve services.

We begin our worship today with The Great Litany, for which the Book of Common Prayer directs, "To be said or sung, kneeling, standing, or in procession; before the Eucharist or after the Collects of Morning or Evening Prayer; or separately; especially in Lent and on Rogation days."

The Great Litany was the first English language rite prepared by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer. It was first published in 1544. The 1979 BCP titled the Litany "The Great Litany" (p. 148), distinguishing it from other litanies in the Prayer Book. When the Great Litany precedes the Eucharist, the Litany concludes with the Kyrie and the Eucharist begins with the salutation and the collect of the day (BCP, p. 153). The Great Litany takes the place of the prayers of the people at the Eucharist. The confession may also be omitted. Please join in the simple responses.

During Advent we also change the setting of the Ordinary of the Mass, using Viadana's Missa Sine Nomine (Mass without a name). We also return to a spoken Lord's Prayer so that we do not become jaded through overuse.

Ludovico Grossi da Viadana (usually Ludovico Viadana, though his family name was Grossi; c. 1560 - 2 May 1627) was an Italian composer, teacher, and Franciscan friar of the Order of Minor Observants. Viadana composed many exceptionally well-crafted motets and mass settings – this is one of the very few in three voices.

The concept of a liturgical *conductus* is steeped in ancient history. Primitive mankind believed that the sun was going away at this time of the year and could only be coaxed back by singing, dancing, and banging away on whatever they could find. Many tunes evolved in this way, and the idea of a *conductus* becomes our processions; straight-line (rather than in a circle) processions were known as "carols" and closely associated with Incarnation festivals.
