

THE LESSONS

#### Genesis 1:1-2:4

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

And God said, "Let there be a dome in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters." So God made the dome and separated the waters that were under the dome from the waters that were above the dome. And it was so. God called the dome Sky. And there was evening and there was morning, the second day.

And God said, "Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. God called the dry land Earth, and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good. Then God said, "Let the earth put forth vegetation: plants yielding seed, and fruit trees of every kind on earth that bear fruit with the seed in it." And it was so. The earth brought forth vegetation: plants yielding seed of every kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.

And God said, "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth." And it was so. God made the two great lights – the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night – and the stars. God set them in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth, to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day.

And God said, "Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the dome of the sky." So God created the great sea monsters and every living creature that moves, of every kind, with which the waters swarm, and every winged bird of every kind. And God saw that it was good. God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth." And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day.

And God said, "Let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind." And it was so. God made the wild animals of the earth of every kind, and the cattle of every kind, and everything that creeps upon the ground of every kind. And God saw that it was good.

Then God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth."

So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. And to every beast of the earth, and to every bird of the air, and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. God saw everything that

he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.



### THE SERMON

The Nicene Creed





# The Breaking of the Bread

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!* 

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.

### THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

The wife of an Anglican bishop, Mrs. Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895) the author of "All things bright and beautiful," wrote nearly 400 hymns, the most famous of which are those written to teach children the meaning of various parts of the Apostles' Creed. The simple yet picturesque words help to describe the phrase "Maker of heaven and earth," which is based on Genesis 1:31: "And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good."

Originally found in A Selection of Psalms and hymns for the Parish Church, Banbury, 1827, Reginald Heber's "Holy, holy, holy! Lord God almighty" is almost the ideal hymn for Trinity Sunday. In spite of a very limited rhyme scheme (the "ee" vowel), irregular accent, and uneven numbers of syllables in the various lines, this hymn based on John's vision of God enthroned in heavenly glory as found in Revelation 4 is a very popular hymn. The use of the angels' song (Holy, holy, holy) is pure adoration of God in his "wholly-otherness." Although filled with apocalyptic language, the hymn combines a sense of mystery with God's mercy, power, love and purity. (From Hymn Notes by Austin Lovelace)

Today's opening voluntary was composed by Friederich Wilhelm Zachau (1663-1712), who probably received his training from his father, the violinist Heinrich Zachau, one of Leipzig's town musicians. The younger Zachau (also frequently spelled Zachow) is now known as George Frideric Handel's first music teacher, having taught Handel how to play the violin, organ, harpsichord, and oboe as well as how to compose music. Zachau's teaching was so effective, that in 1702 at the age of seventeen, Handel took over his teacher's position as organist at Halle. It is said that after Zachau died in 1712, Handel became a benefactor to his widow and children in gratitude for his teacher's instruction.

When Martin Luther's Reformation liturgical changes were begun his idea was to replace the Latin portions of the Ordinary of the mass (Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, etc.) With German hymns that expressed the same idea. As a substitute for the Gloria in excelsis he used the German hymn Allein Gott in der Hoh Sei Ehr, and for the next several weeks we will make the same substitution. This tune, and the text to which we sing it ("All glory be to God on high") should already be familiar to everyone in the parish.

Also we begin a practice which is probably entirely new to almost everyone at St. John's. The Rev. Christopher Webber has compiled a set of metrical settings of all the Psalms that we use in our three-year cycle and set them to familiar hymn tunes. Take a moment each Sunday and compare these metrical settings with the original psalms as found in our *Book of Common Prayer*. These are exceptional works of artistry and hopefully will lead us into a deeper appreciation and understanding of these Psalm texts.
