Preparation for Worship







B rothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh – for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ – if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.


I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. For the creation waits with

eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

Tesus put before the crowd another parable: **J** "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?' He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and But he replied, 'No; for in gather them?' gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.""

And his disciples approached him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Let anyone with ears listen!"

THE SERMON





await the day of his coming.



The Breaking of the Bread Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!*

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.



THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Walter Chalmers Smith's (1824-1908) "Immortal, invisible, God only Wise" was first found in *Hymns of Christ and the Christian Life*, 1867. "Now unto the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only wise God, be honor and glory forever and ever" (I Timothy 1:17) is the basis for this hymn of pure praise. The rollicking anapestic rhythm of the Welsh melody rushes the singer along to the climactic poetic thought of God being invisible only because He is hidden by the splendor of light. (from *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)

Samuel Sebastian Wesley was one of the most influential and important church musicians of the nineteenth century. Son of the musician Samuel Wesley and grandson of Charles Wesley, S. S. Wesley worked hard to reform music practices in the cathedrals and parishes of England during his lifetime of 1810-1876. He served a number of cathedrals, concluding his career at Gloucester. Perhaps his best known music is the tune AURELIA to which we sing the hymn "The Church's One Foundation." Almost all of Wesley's output is choral, including some truly wonderful anthems.

A number of years ago Dr. D. was travelling in Germany and attended services at the Cathedral in Stuttgart. The cathedral's windows, blown out in the war and replaced with clear glass, cast a remarkable amount of illumination inside this old and very ornate edifice – quite a contrast to the dark gothic cathedrals he had been seeing in other parts of Europe. The first time he heard the second movement of Paul Hindemith's first organ sonata he instantly had a mental vision of that Stuttgart church. The music is very much in the form of the German Baroque: trio style, imitative, ornamented.. At the same time the harmonic language is the clear glass of the twentieth century-unresolved (but mild) dissonance, sudden juxtapositions of tonality, angular melodic motives. It's a deeply meditative piece which calls for the total aural immersion of the listener. Quiet your minds, listen deeply, and prepare yourself to enter the presence of God in the next hour.

Tillman Susato was important as a composer and very important as a music printer. Much about his origins and early years is unknown. Susato wrote and arranged various dances of the time in relatively simple, more homophonic texture. (from an *Artist Biography* by Joseph Stevenson)
