

THE LESSONS

Genesis 45:1-15

Joseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, "Send everyone away from me." So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of Pharaoh heard it. Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. He said, "I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. And now do not be distressed, or angry with yourselves, because you sold me here; for God sent me before you to preserve life. For the famine has been in the land these two years; and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. So it was not you who sent me here, but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house

and ruler over all the land of Egypt. Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, 'Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me, do not delay. You shall settle in the land of Goshen, and you shall be near me, you and your children and your children's children, as well as your flocks, your herds, and all that you have. I will provide for you there - since there are five more years of famine to come - so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty.' And now your eyes and the eyes of my brother Benjamin see that it is my own mouth that speaks to you. You must tell my father how greatly I am honored in Egypt, and all that you have seen. Hurry and bring my father down here." Then he fell upon his brother Benjamin's neck and wept, while Benjamin wept upon his neck. And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

For the gifts and the calling of God are



Matthew 15:10-20, 21-28

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

Tesus called the crowd to him and said to them, **J** "Listen and understand: it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness,

slander. These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile."

Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.

THE SERMON

The Nicene Creed



Remembering now his work of redemption, and offering to you this sacrifice of thanksgiving, We celebrate his death and resurrection, as we await the day of his coming.



The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.

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THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Henry Purcell's "Voluntary on Old Hundredth" has as its subtitle "For double organ" and this probably refers to the fact that it is to be played on an organ with more than one division. Our instrument has three divisions, one for each of the two manuals (played by the hands) and one for the pedals (played by the feet.) In Purcell's setting the familiar tune is hard to miss, especially when it sounds in the lowest octave and the upper accompanimental voices are ornate in keeping with the 17th century style.

Isaac Watts' "From all that dwell below the skies" was originally found in his Psalms of David, 1719. Based on the two verses that make up the shortest psalm (117), Watts' two stanzas entitled "Praise to God from all Nations" is the first of three versions which he made - in Long Meter, Short Meter, and Common Meter. To the two stanzas John Wesley added two more by an anonymous poet, possibly Robert Spence. Watts' psalm paraphrases set a high standard for later poets.

The Prelude in E minor we hear today was for many years believed to have been composed by J. S. Bach, but now thought to be more likely from a set of eight by one of Bach's premiere students, Johann Krebs. It is the most somber of the set of eight but shows Krebs' mastery of contrapuntal writing.

"Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven" was written by Henry Lyte (1793-1847) and first appeared in his *Spirit of the Psalms* of 1835. While earlier hymnodists made paraphrases of hymns, Lyte, who won the prize for poetry three years in a row at Trinity College, Dublin, added a new dimension by making them poetical interpretations. This version of Psalm 103 includes such memorable lines as "Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven," and "Father-like he tends and spares us." Unfortunately the stanza based on verses 15-17 beginning "Frail as summer's flower we flourish, Blows the wind, and it is gone" is omitted from our hymnal. (from *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)


