
For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus,

THE SERMON







Remembering now his work of redemption, and offering to you this sacrifice of thanksgiving, We celebrate his death and resurrection, as we


await the day of his coming.

The Breaking of the Bread

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!*

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.



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THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Today we observe the Feast of the Transfiguration, in the New Testament, the occasion upon which Jesus took three of his disciples, Peter, James, and John, up on a mountain, where Moses and Elijah appeared and Jesus was transfigured, his face and clothes becoming dazzlingly bright. The Transfiguration is recorded in all three of the Synoptic Gospels and is understood to have been the revelation of the eternal glory of the second person of the Trinity, which was normally veiled during Christ's life on earth. Traditionally observed on August 6, the Transfiguration is ranked alongside Jesus' baptism and the Crucifixion, Resurrection, and Ascension as a key milestone of his life and ministry.

"How firm a foundation" was first found as "K" in John Rippon's A Selection of Hymns in 1787. Since Richard Keen was the precentor (song leader) in Dr. Rippon's church in London, it is reasonable to assume that he was the author. There are many Scriptural references: Isaiah 43:1-5, 12, Timothy 2:19, and Hebrews 13:5. It is basically about the promises of God, and hymnals use quotation marks for all of the stanzas in which various promises are quoted. The last line, "I'll never, no ever, no, never forsake!" is a triumphant conclusion.*

Composed in 1880 during the last years of Liszt's life, the *Infesto transfigurationis Domini nostri Jesu Christi* is an exquisitely crafted composition which shows Liszt's religious convictions as clearly as his personal life was fraught with contradictions to those beliefs. Like most of his sacred works, this piece reflects an intimate and humble spiritual world, bordering on asceticism. With harplike strokes, this work comes to a lyrical and uplifting close that holds a feeling of peace and serenity.

Modern day lack of knowledge of the Scriptures makes hymns such as "O God of Bethel" obscure to many worshipers. This hymn, headed "Jacob's vow; from Genesis 28:20-22" is a paraphrase of the story of Jacob making a vow with God: "if God will be with me, and will keep me in this way that I go, and will give me bread to eat, and raiment to put on, so that I may come again to my father's house in peace; then shall the Lord be my God." The revision in the Scottish Paraphrases brings us all personally into the story and into a covenant with God.*


