

#### **Exodus 16:2-15**

The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger."

Then the Lord said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the

people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not. On the sixth day, when they prepare what they bring in, it will be twice as much as they gather on other days." So Moses and Aaron said to all the Israelites, "In the evening you shall know that it was the Lord who brought you out of the land of Egypt, and in the morning you shall see the glory of the Lord, because he has heard your complaining against

the Lord. For what are we, that you complain against us?" And Moses said, "When the Lord gives you meat to eat in the evening and your fill of bread in the morning, because the Lord has heard the complaining that you utter against him – what are we? Your complaining is not against us but against the Lord."

Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, 'Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard your complaining." And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. The Lord spoke to Moses and said, "I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At

twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God."

In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat."

## Philippians 1:21-30

To me, living is Christ and dying is gain. If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which I prefer. I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better; but to remain in the flesh is more necessary for you. Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, so that I may share abundantly in your boasting in Christ Jesus when I come to you again.

Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see

you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, and are in no way intimidated by your opponents. For them this is evidence of their destruction, but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ, but of suffering for him as well – since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

#### Matthew 20:1-16

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.* 

Jesus said, "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.'

He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' But he replied to one of them,

'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to

me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So the last will be first, and the first will be last."



# The Breaking of the Bread

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!* 

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.



#### THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Most classical hymns are Bibically oriented, and "Glorious things of thee are spoken" has references to Isaiah 33:20-21, Psalm 87:3, I Peter 2, Revelation 1, and Exodus 13:22. The author, John Newton (1725-1807), most famous for "Amazing grace," included this in his *Olney Hymns*, written to educate his congregation about the Bible. Like all good hymn writers, Newton knew that hymns are excellent tools for teaching Biblical truth and wisdom, and should be sung with an open and questing mind.

"A namby-pamby, childish style is most unpleasing to children. It is surprising how soon they can understand and follow a high order of poetry." Thus wrote Cecil Frances Alexander, author of the hymn "Jesus calls us." She was a 19th century educator in her native Ireland and wrote many hymns for children to illuminate and expand the Catechism – on Baptism, the Creed, the Commandments, Prayer and the Lord's Supper. This hymn was originally intended for St. Andrew's day.

A "verset" is a short phrase from a sacred book and in music it usually refers to a brief organ piece designed for use in the Eucharist. Charles Tournemire (1870-1939) was a French composer and organist most famous for his improvisation at the Basilica of St. Clotilde in Paris. These little versets were almost undoubtedly some of his improvisations that were later written down. His output of eight symphonies, four operas, twelve chamber works and eighteen piano pieces is largely forgotten, but his organ music – and especially his virtuosic Tu es Petra (Thou art the Rock) – is still frequently heard on recitals.

Our closing hymn, "Rise up, ye saints of God" was written by William P. Merrill (1867-1954) and was originally written ("Rise up, O men of God") specifically for men, inspired by the need of a brotherhood hymn for the Presbyterian Brotherhood Movement. Merrill was a famous Presbyterian pastor in Chicago, who later became one of three writers to serve Brick Presbyterian Church in New York City – the others being Henry Van Dyke and Maltbie D. Babcock. In the widespread hymnic revisions of the 1970's and 80's many texts were changed to reflect the move toward more inclusivity and to remove what was seen as sexism. (From *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)

## **Excerpts from "The Mission of St. John's"**

Soon after St. John's doors were open for the first time, Mr. W.R. Harris, one of the original 29 members made the chancel furniture. The altar is a perfect gem; for elegance and artistic finish, is equal to, and rarely seen outside our cities. Mr. Harris also made the baptismal font and it shows his skill as a woodworker. Mr. Harris moved to Daytona where he passed away in 1899.

General John Breckenridge Castleman\* and his wife were long-time winter members of St. John's. After the General's death in 1918, Mrs. Castleman donated an antique chair described as "oval, ornate and heavy" to be used as a Bishop's chair.

\*Born in Kentucky, John Castleman, at the age of 19, entered into Confederate service. He was promoted to major in 1864, and led guerrillas in the attempted burning of supply boats in St. Louis, Missouri and was arrested in October 1864 at Sullivan, Indiana. He was convicted of spying and sentenced to death, but his execution was stayed by Abraham Lincoln. Following the war, Castleman was exiled from the United States, and studied medicine in France. He was pardoned by president Andrew Johnson and returned to Kentucky in 1866.

He revived the Louisville Legion, a militia unit, in 1878 and became adjutant general of Kentucky in 1883. After the Spanish–American War, he was promoted to brigadier general and served as military governor of Puerto Rico.


