Tesus said, "Listen to another parable. There J was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time."

Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls."

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.





Remembering now his work of redemption, and offering to you this sacrifice of thanksgiving,


We celebrate his death and resurrection, as we await the day of his coming.



The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

The Episcopal Church has a long and rich history of music in its liturgy with distinct roles for choir and congregation. When music notation is provided in our Sunday Bulletin it is an invitation for whole-hearted congregational participation. Even if you think you "don't sing" simply reading the words while they are being sung keeps you a full participant in the liturgy, as does careful listening when the choir sings. St. Augustine is reported to have said, "He who sings, prays twice."

Translated by John Mason Neale (1818-1866), "Christ is made the sure foundation" is an ancient Latin hymn from the 7th century about blessed Jerusalem and is based on St. Paul's description of the church in Ephesians 2:20, 21: "build upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the chief corner-stone, in whom the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord." As "living stones" we are joined together to form a "spiritual house" with Christ as the foundation of all. (From *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)

As today's final hymn we sing a traditional *Hora*, a Jewish dance song, to the text "Open your ears, O faithful people" – a reminder that God's gifts to us are boundless and that we must respond with our own gifts to Him. At the autumn festival of *Simchas Torah* observant Jews dance with the *Torah* scrolls (our books of *Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers* and *Deuteronomy*) to celebrate the gift of God's word. As we sing *Torah ora* (The Law is our Light) let us do so with exuberance in our gratitude for all we are given.

William Dawson's arrangements of traditional African-American spirituals are widely published in the United States and are regularly performed by church, school, college and community choral programs. According to Dominique-René de Lerma of Lawrence Univrsity in notes to "The Spirituals of William L. Dawson" produced by The St. Olaf Choir in 1997, "What is even more striking than the richness of Dawson's textures is the lushness of his sonorities, exhibiting his remarkable insight into vocal potentials." While this morning's version of "Ev'ry time" is much simplified, it owes a lot to Dawson's arrangement.

Memories of St. John's

In 1925 a parishioner donated a small reed organ to the church; however, the Florida climate caused the keys to stick constantly. Many technicians were called in to work on the small organ but unfortunately nothing seemed to work leaving the choir and the vicar with a very limited number of hymns that could be sung using the keys that did not stick. Much later a note was found inside the organ that read, 'This organ can be fixed only by the grace of God.'

You will all remember the organ fund drive in 2020 spearheaded by Hasty Miller to replace the console in the 100-year-old organ we use today and the enormous task of hauling it into the choir loft. (Featured in the January-February 2021, and May-June, 2021 Good News)

This was not the first time Hasty was involved in such a maneuver. Some years ago, a grand piano was donated to the church by Barbara Kreher, the music director and with Hasty's expertise it was hoisted into the loft using a hand winch and rigging similar to those used in sailing. Each time there is a challenge at St. John's, a solution is never far behind.
