
THE LESSONS

THE SERMON





Remembering now his work of redemption, and offering to you this sacrifice of thanksgiving,


We celebrate his death and resurrection, as we await the day of his coming.

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.



THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

A.T. Olajida Olude (1908-c. 1986) was a Nigerian Methodist minister educated at Wesley College, Ibadan, and at the Mindola training school. A.M. Jones, a Roman Catholic musical missionary and hymnologist, described Olude as "profoundly upset by the way European-type hymns murdered his language." According to Jones, Olude built up a collection of at least 77 hymns whose melodies followed precisely the speech tones of the Yoruba language "in every verse." While in a Mission School in the 1940s, Olude learned a text by Elizabeth Parsons, "Jesus, We Love to Meet," dating from 1840. He based his Yoruba translation ("Jesu a fe pade," 1949) on Parsons' text and composed his own melody. The poet takes us through a worship service-gathering 'round thy throne" (stanza one); kneeling in "awe and fear" (stanza two); rejoicing in God's blessing (stanza three); and consecrating ourselves (stanza four). The fourth stanza also has a line that asks God to "bless the sermon in this place." (from Michael Hawn, Prof. of Church Music at SMU)

Our final hymn, "Rise up, ye saints of God" was written by William P. Merrill (1867-1954) and was originally written ("Rise up, O men of God") specifically for men, inspired by the need of a brotherhood hymn for the Presbyterian Brotherhood Movement. Merrill was a famous Presbyterian pastor in Chicago, who later became one of three writers to serve Brick Presbyterian Church in New York City – the others being Henry Van Dyke and Maltbie D. Babcock. In the widespread hymnic revisions of the 1970's and 80's many texts were changed to reflect the move toward more inclusivity and to remove what was seen as sexism.
