

#### Joshua 3:7-17

The Lord said to Joshua, "This day I will begin **1** to exalt you in the sight of all Israel, so that they may know that I will be with you as I was You are the one who shall with Moses. command the priests who bear the ark of the covenant, 'When you come to the edge of the waters of the Jordan, you shall stand still in the Jordan." Joshua then said to the Israelites, "Draw near and hear the words of the Lord your God." Joshua said, "By this you shall know that among you is the living God who without fail will drive out from before you the Canaanites, Hittites, Hivites, Perizzites, Girgashites, Amorites, and Jebusites: the ark of the covenant of the Lord of all the earth is going to pass before you into the Jordan. So now select twelve men from the tribes of Israel, one from each tribe. When the soles of the feet of the priests who bear the ark of the Lord, the Lord of all the earth, rest in the waters of the Jordan, the waters of the Jordan flowing from above shall be cut off; they shall stand in a single heap."

When the people set out from their tents to cross over the Jordan, the priests bearing the ark of the covenant were in front of the people. Now the Jordan overflows all its banks throughout the time of harvest. So when those who bore the ark had come to the Jordan, and the feet of the priests bearing the ark were dipped in the edge of the water, the waters flowing from above stood still, rising up in a single heap far off at Adam, the city that is beside Zarethan, while those flowing toward the sea of the Arabah, the Dead Sea, were wholly cut off. Then the people crossed over opposite Jericho. While all Israel were crossing over on dry ground, the priests who bore the ark of the covenant of the Lord stood on dry ground in the middle of the Jordan, until the entire nation finished crossing over the Jordan.

Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?

Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God?

Answer I renounce them.

Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior?

Answer I do.

Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love?

Answer I do.

Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord?

Answer I do.

The priest addresses the congregation, saying

Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ? *We will*.

Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant.

# **The Baptismal Covenant**

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?

I will, with God's help.

Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord? *I will, with God's help*.

Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

I will, with God's help.

Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?

I will, with God's help.

Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? *I will, with God's help*.






Have mercy, Lord, for we are sinners in your sight.

On the night he was betrayed he took bread, said the blessing, broke the bread, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. # The Breaking of the Bread Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.

### THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Today we celebrate the Feast of All Saints, celebrated in honor of all the saints of the church, whether they are known or unknown. From the 4<sup>th</sup> century, feasts commemorating all Christian martyrs were held in various places on various dates near Easter and Pentecost. In the 9<sup>th</sup> century, some churches in the British Isles began holding the commemoration of all saints on 1 November, and in the 9<sup>th</sup> century this was extended to the whole Catholic Church by Pope Gregory IV. In Western Christianity, it is still celebrated on 1 November by a majority of Christian Churches, and now we usually "translate" the Feast to the Sunday following November 1.

Based on the picture of a "cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1), William W. How's (1823-1897) "For all the saints" gives thanks for the saints of old, makes a prayer that we may be found faithful, and acknowledges the unity of the whole Church in heaven and on earth in the mystical body of Christ, a picture of the church in holy warfare, and a vision of the victorious Church. Vaughan Williams' magnificent marching tune makes this a contemporary version of "When the saints go marching in."

"I sing a song of the saints of God" was penned by Lesbia Scott (1898-1986) for her Everyday Hymns for Children (1929). Are there any saints living today? The author's three children often asked such questions, and this hymn was written for All Saints' Day to suggest that there are plenty of saints alive today in all sorts jobs – and that anyone can be a saint if we really work at it. The tune Grand Isle has just the light-hearted, joyful feeling to fit the disarmingly simple and picturesque text. To really enjoy it, become as a child! (from Hymn Notes by Austin Lovelace)

The Rev. Regina Christiansen, now serving a congregation in Vermont after years as an Episcopal nun, has added a new, very tongue-in-cheek verse which speaks rather eloquently to our modern condition, "and one was a loser, and one was a geek; and one was a long-haired, hippy freak; but they all went to church at least once a week! And I want to be one, too!

Sir John Goss (1800-1880) was an English organist, composer and teacher. Born to a musical family, Goss was a boy chorister of the Chapel Royal, London, and later a pupil of Thomas Attwood, organist of St Paul's Cathedral. After a brief period as a chorus member in an opera company he was appointed organist of a chapel in south London, later moving to more prestigious organ posts at St Luke's Church, Chelsea and finally St Paul's Cathedral, where he struggled to improve musical standards.

#### Excerpts from "The Mission of St. John's"

#### St. John's, The Parish

St. John's of the early 1960s was virtually unchanged from the original building. It was still a small, white wooden structure in the Gothic style, sitting close to Young Street, and seating approximately 85 persons.

Walk up the three steps to the covered stoop, enter the double doors which were never locked, walk down the center aisle flanked by heavy, dark, wooden pews equipped with narrow, creaky kneelers. The stained-glass windows would be ajar if the weather was fair, providing quiet breezes and the sound of birdsong and lawn mowers.

Downtown Eau Gallie in the early 1960s presented a different face to the newcomer. A new city Hall had recently been built, housing the city offices and police department. In the Civic Center next door, there were several small rooms given over to use as the Public Library. Across from City Hall on Highland Avenue was Curry-Dunlap Department Store, south on that block was Karrick's Grocery and the Eau Gallie Florist (long owned and operated by St. John's members, Mary Louise and Tyler Jackson.

On Highland Avenue, in the block south of City Hall, was a small but fairly complete shopping area: two modern drug stores, both with lunch counters where most of the town gossip and news was regularly passed along over morning coffee; a bank building; Mathers Bakery, a Woolworth's 5 and 10, Eau Gallie 5 and 10 and Jr. Dept. Store. Harden Holt Dress Shop, a dry-cleaners, a gift shop, and a cobblers. Ken's stationery and Eau Gallie Hardware were side by side on the south side of Ninth Street (now Eau Gallie Boulevard.) he northeast corner of Ninth and Highland was known as Gleason's corner, and had a small, rustic log building, complete with totem pole, known as the Scout Hut. The corner was regularly and generously lent to St. John's, as well as other organizations, for rummage and bake sales.

Parishioner Memories -Picnics in St. John's Park. The Park across the street was finished after the turn of the century, adding a gazebo and garden benches; and traditionally St. John's picnics were held there after the service, usually on the Sunday of Pentecost, and one more in the fall. The picnics in the park were usually spearheaded By Deacon Elizabeth and her husband Doug, Cindy and Jim Marshall, Charlene, Elizabeth and Woody Turner, Trish Seymore, Kathy and Bob Oas, along with many others too numerous to mention. Hot dogs and hamburgers were the order of the day. Usually, we added a bounce house set up for the children. The rest of us would bring a covered dish and our Lounge Chairs, and sit around enjoying the ambiance that our new park provided, with the many shade trees, cool breezes from the river, and the always present wild parrots. - P. 
