

Mark 1:4-11

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the

thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

THE SERMON

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.







Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and

when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith: *Christ has died.*

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints nto the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!*

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Due to COVID restrictions, wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest when the chalice bearer comes by, then return to your seat.





THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Yesterday was the Feast of the Epiphany (from the Greek word meaning manifestation.) Our Christian holiday commemorates the first manifestation of Jesus Christ to the Gentiles, represented by the Magi, the manifestation of his divinity, as it occurred at his baptism in the Jordan River and at his first miracle, at Cana in Galilee. In the West the evening preceding Epiphany is called Twelfth Night, concluding the Twelve Days of Christmas. We continue in the Season of Epiphanytide until Ash Wednesday ushers us into the Lenten season.

Johannes Brahms (1833 - 1897) was a German composer and pianist. Born in Hamburg into a Lutheran family, Brahms spent much of his professional life in Vienna. In his lifetime, Brahms's popularity and influence were considerable. He is sometimes grouped with Johann Sebastian Bach and Ludwig van Beethoven as one of the "Three Bs", a comment originally made by the nineteenth-century conductor Hans von Bülow. His setting of O GOD, THOU BELOVED GOD is one of his very few compositions for organ.

"I sing the almighty power of God" is one of the outstanding hymn texts of Isaac Watts, (1674 -1748, and first found in his Divine Songs Attempted in Easy Language, for the Use of Children,)1715. It is rare that a profound theologian and hymn writer can write well for children, but at least in this one hymn Watts succeeded. His collection was the first hymnal written exclusively for children. The words are filled with vivid pictures of the handiworks of God, and remind us that God is everywhere in our midst. (It is alright for adults to sing this, too!)

"O love, how deep, how broad, how high" is attributed to Thomas à Kempis (1379 -1471) and first found in the 15th century *Karlsruhe* manuscript. We sing this text today in the translations by Benjamin Webb (1819 -1885). Of it, the American hymnodist Austin Lovelace observes, "Is it really possible to measure the dimensions of the love of God – how deep, how broad, how high? This

ancient hymn attempts to do it by rehearsing the entire life, ministry, death, resurrection and ascension of Christ plus the sending of the Holy Spirit. And all of Christ's life and work was "for us" – a phrase which is repeated over and over." (from *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)

The Reverend Fred Pratt Green (1903 - 2000) was a British Methodist minister and one of the 20th century's outstanding hymnodists. His poem which we hear this morning in a musical setting by Dr. D. is a brilliant juxtaposition of the nativity events with our modern day situation. The final stanza makes an exceptionally fitting period to the paragraph that has been our Christmas celebrations.

We begin again at the Distribution to use hymns from the Taizé tradition in hope that ALL in the congregation will join with the choir in singing these simple refrains. Today's example is interspersed with short verses sung by the choir. Give it a try! We think you'll be glad you did.


