



THE LESSONS

All sit

Acts 8:26-40

n angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up Aand go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

1 John 4:7-21

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and

believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is those who love God must love their this: brothers and sisters also.

THE SERMON

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.







Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Christ is risen.


Christ will come again.

The Breaking of the Bread

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!*

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Note that wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread

and cross your arms over your chest until the chalice bearer passes by, then return to your seat.

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

"O love, how deep, how broad, how high" is attributed to Thomas à Kempis (1379-1471) and first found in the 15th century Karlsruhe manuscript. We sing this text today in the translation by Benjamin Webb (1819-11885). Of it, the American hymnodist Austin Lovelace observes, "Is it really possible to measure the dimensions of the love of God – how deep, how broad, how high? This ancient hymn attempts to do it by rehearsing the entire life, ministry, death, resurrection and ascension of Christ plus the sending of the Holy Spirit. And all of Christ's life and work was "for us" – a phrase which is repeated over and over."

"We know that Christ was raised" (published in Hymns and Songs, 1969) was written by John B. Geyer (b. 1932) and, of this hymn based on Romans 6 the author has written, "We know that Christ was raised' was written in 1967, when I was tutor at Cheshunt College, Cambridge, U.K. At that time a good deal of work was going on round the corner (involving a number of American research students) producing living cells ('the baby in the test tube'). The hymn attempted to illustrate the Christian doctrine of baptism in relation to those experiments. Originally intended as a hymn for the Sacrament of Baptism, it has become popular as an Easter hymn." The tune to which this hymn will be sung is entitled ENGELBERG, a fine example of English hymn-writing by an eminent early twentieth-century composer, Sir Charles Villiers Stanford, whose 100th year death anniversary we observe this month.

Our closing hymn is a creation of the Rev. Cyril Alington (1872-1955), former headmaster of Eton and from 1921 chaplain to the king of England. His intent was to create a new hymn for Easter to the tune to which we sing it. Few new hymns for the Easter season succeed, but lines such as "the life laid down, the life restored" help to remind us of the eternal freshness of the Easter message. (from Hymn Notes by Austin Lovelace.)

Alington's original version began "Good Christian men, rejoice and sing." The change is due to the vigilance with which the editors of our hymnal have applied the concept of inclusive language. Most references to purely male imagery have been omitted with, in the opinion of our O/C, little damage. Sometimes it is difficult for us to perceive God in other than the stereotypical male images but we grow in our faith as we grapple with this – and many other – challenges to tradition.

Dr. D's "God of mercy God of grace" was composed for his choir at St. John's Methodist Church in Baton Rouge Louisiana during the time when he was associate dean of the music school at LSU. It was subsequently published by Saint James' Press and has found its way into the repertory of a large number of church choirs.


