



THE LESSONS

All sit

Acts 2:1-21

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs – in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Tesus said to his disciples, "When the Advocate J comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who comes from the Father, he will testify on my behalf. You also are to testify because you have been with me from the beginning.

THE SERMON

The Nicene Creed



Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.


We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O

The Breaking of the Bread Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!* The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Note that wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest until the chalice bearer passes by, then return to your seat.



THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

The organ's chimes are a signal for all to take their seats, cease conversations, and be prayerful in preparation for our worship together. The opening organ voluntary is intended as a sort of "airlock," separating us from our earthly cares and ushering us into the presence of God. By being quiet and listening carefully, sometimes we may clearly hear the voice of God in our mind.

Pentecost (fiftieth day) is one of the three major feasts (Christmas and Easter the others) of the Christian liturgical year, commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. It's also called *Whitsunday* (White Sunday), due to the tradition of baptizing new Christians who wore white robes. Pentecost is often described as the "Birthday of the Church".

"Hail thee, festival day" was written by Venantius Fortunatus (535-609) and translated by several, but especially by Percy Dearmer (1867-1936) from the *Tempore Florigero*, c. 950. Fortunatus was a poet and traveling singer who settled at Poitiers under the influence of Queen Rhadegunda, and was made Bishop of Poitiers in 599. The original had 110 lines of poetry on the Resurrection, and was an Easter poem not designed for singing. It is one of the first to compare the Easter theme to spring and the renewal of nature. During the Middle Ages various sections were used for processionals for festival days, using lines 39 and 40 (Hail thee, festival day) as a refrain. (From *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)

"Come down, O Love Divine" is a 15th century Italian hymn by Bianco da Siena (d. 1434) and a fine example of pre-Reformation hymns of praise and devotion. Many were written by penitents who, frightened by the devastating wars and plagues of their time, sought atonement for sins by a deeper life of devotion. Ralph Vaughan Williams' beautiful hymn tune is perfectly suited to the introspective character of the text.

Today is the last Sunday of our parish choir as they begin their summer hiatus. St. John's is extraordinarily fortunate to have a choir and especially so to have one populated by singers who give so generously of their time and talent so that our worship may be conducted "decently and in good order," to quote St. Paul. Take a moment and say a prayer of Thanksgiving for Susan Badgio, Deb Ball, Gail Dunbar, Hasty Miller, Dick Muir, Sandra Pekar, Sallie Razor, Sally Tammen, Sylvia Tammen, Lois Thayer, and our Organ Scholar Dallas Gambrell II. Our worship life is so much richer because of their hard work and dedication.
