

The Congregation joins in the portions printed in **bold italics**.





THE LESSONS

2 Samuel 18:5-9, 15, 31-33

The king, David, ordered Joab and Abishai and Ittai, saying, "Deal gently for my sake with the young man Absalom." And all the people heard when the king gave orders to all the commanders concerning Absalom. So the army went out into the field against Israel; and the battle was fought in the forest of Ephraim. The men of Israel were defeated there by the servants of David, and the slaughter there was great on that day, twenty thousand men. The battle spread over the face of all the country; and the forest claimed more victims that day than the sword. Absalom happened to meet the servants of David.

Absalom was riding on his mule, and the mule went under the thick branches of a great oak. His head caught fast in the oak, and he was left hanging between heaven and earth, while the mule that was under him went on.

And ten young men, Joab's armor-bearers,



THE SERMON

The Nicene Creed



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Note that wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest until the chalice bearer passes by, then return to your seat.

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Some of the stanzas of the African American spiritual "Let us break bread together" may date back to the eighteenth century. Other stanzas have been added by oral tradition. A look through modern hymnals will reveal an array of variations on the text. The song's use at communion services probably dates from after the American Civil War. Miles Mark Fisher notes in *Negro Slave Songs* in the United States (1953), Originally the hymn relates hardly at all to holy communion, which does not necessarily require early morning administration or a devotee who faces east. This it seems was a signal song of Virginia slaves during the eighteenth century who used it and similar ones to convene their secret meetings. (from the *Psalter Hymnal Handbook*, 1988)

We hear a Prelude and Fugue, for many years believed to have been composed by J. S. Bach, but now thought to be more likely from a set of eight by one of Bach's premiere students, Johann Krebs. Fugues sometime get an undeservedly bad rap: the name comes from the Latin *fuga*, meaning "flight" as one voice (melody) is stated then "chased" by others. Listen carefully to the opening statement, which is then immediately imitated by the same idea in a new key, and subsequent entries stack up on one another. Fugues offer superb material for the careful listener – how many times (and in how many different ways) do you hear the opening idea (called the subject) in these fugues?

William Williams (1717-1791) wrote "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah" at the urging of a Welsh evangelist, under whom he was converted. The author began writing hymns as a Welsh Calvinist-Methodist minister. His brother Peter, who was later expelled from the church for heresy, provided the translation. The Exodus and the journey through the wilderness to Canaan is the basis of the hymn with references to "Bread of heaven" (Exodus 16:4-18), "the crystal fountain" (Exodus 17:4-6), "The fiery, cloudy pillar" (Exodus 13:21), and "verge of JORDAN" (Joshua 3:14-17). The reference to "Death of death and Hell's Destruction" is to Christ (II Timothy 1:10 and Revelation 1:17, 18). (From *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)
