Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and

death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!*


The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The usher will indicate when it is time for your row to come forward to the altar rail to receive Communion. If you wish to receive Communion in your pew, please let the usher know and it will be brought to you. When you go forward, an usher will indicate where to kneel at the rail, then hold your hands in front of you, one on top of the other, to receive the bread. Note that wine is by "intinction" only. No one sips from the common cup. If you wish to receive the wine, after the clergy places the bread in your hand, just hold it out for the chalice bearer, who will dip it in the wine and place it on your tongue. If you do not wish to receive the wine, simply consume the bread and cross your arms over your chest until the chalice bearer passes by, then return to your seat.

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

Again our service this morning is being played by Sylvia Tammen, our organ scholar, while the Rev. and Dr. Davidson take a much-needed break. Take a moment to offer a prayer of thanksgiving for Sylvia and all the others who give of their talent and time so that our worship may be conducted "decently and in good order" – to quote St. Paul.

Based on the picture of a "cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1), William How's "For all the saints" gives thanks for the saints of old, makes a prayer that we may be found faithful, and acknowledges the unity of the whole Church in heaven and on earth in the mystical body of Christ, a picture of the church in holy warfare, and a vision of the victorious Church. Vaughan Williams' magnificent marching tune makes this a contemporary version of "When the saints go marching in."*

Sir John Goss (1800-1880) was an English organist, composer and teacher. Born to a musical family, Goss was a boy chorister of the Chapel Royal. After a brief period as a chorus member in an opera company he was appointed organist of a chapel in south London, later moving to more prestigious organ posts and finally St Paul's Cathedral, where he struggled to improve musical standards. From 1827 to 1874, Goss was a professor at the Royal Academy of Music where his pupils included Arthur Sullivan (of "Gilbert & Sullivan" fame) and John Stainer, who succeeded him as organist there at St. Pauls.

"Lift up your heads, ye mighty gates," our Presentation Hymn, is the most famous paraphrase of Psalm 24. Written by Georg Weissel and translated by Catherine Winkworth from the *Preussische Festlieder* of 1642, the text reveals a spirit of praise and hope unexpected from the depths of the dreadful years of the Thirty Years' War. Its theme is the preparation for the Messiah's coming.*

Take a look at our closing hymn, "Jerusalem, the golden" and imagine writing a poem of 2,966 lines in dactylic hexameters (six groups of triplets) with inner rhyme, to describe the evils and vices (including those of the church) of the times. The author, Bernard of Cluny (12th century) remarked, "Unless the Spirit of wisdom and understanding had flowed in upon me, I could not have put together so long a work in so difficult a meter." John Mason Neale's (1818-1866) translation of a very small portion of the long poem directs our thoughts toward heaven and encourages us to

keep striving to reach that marvelous country. We sing this to the tune Ewing, and although not a well known tune it deserves to be much better known, with its grand sweeps of melody*. *from *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace
