

Tending to your Spiritual Life

Let us resist the temptation to believe that we are all too busy to make time for prayer and devotion in our lives. I encourage you – even urge you – to set aside just a few minutes each day to sit (or walk) in quiet contemplation of the beauty and wonder of this world which God has created for us and given to us to enjoy and maintain. I encourage you to use the Daily Office as it is given us in the Book of **Common Prayer** in both the language of Rite I and Rite II: Morning Prayer, Noonday Prayer; Evening Prayer, and Compline (bedtime prayer) are all published in the BCP, both in their formal version and in a shorter version for Individuals and Families (beginning on p. 136). If you wish to join others around the world in the Daily Office, try going to missionstclare.com and you will find the services complete with hymns. It's a delightful way to begin or end the day! The devotional booklet "Forward Day by Day," published by the Episcopal Church is available for daily reading online. I hope you will find them helpful in strengthening your prayer life!

Our Focus this month is Life Recaptured. Refuge & Freedom

Life Recaptured is a local program that assists girls to escape the nightmare of sex trafficking. Their residential safe homes provide refuge and freedom for their residents, and they work closely with local law enforcement as well as contacts in other areas. This vile trade operates right under our noses here in Brevard County, and we are delighted that God has opened a way for us to support this rescue. Florida is #3 in the nation for sex trafficking.

Their gift shop and beauty boutique are open Monday through Saturday at 5515 N. Courtney Parkway, Merrit Island, and well worth the visit. Their Connections Café, 3757 N.U.S. 1, open Wednesday through Saturday and offers delicious food. On Saturday they also hold a farmer's market. Visit liferecaptured.org. for more information.

Our Outreach partner this month is Nana's House whose mission is to provide a safe, secure, loving home where neglected, abused, needy or abandoned children can experience God's love and healing. Nana's House is 100% community funded and every penny donated goes directly to caring for the children. They do not accept State funding. They are 100% volunteers – no paid staff. They are in partnership with the organization One More Child, and all the foster families are licensed and trained by them to care for children in the state foster system. They are governed by a Board of Directors who meet quarterly to oversee our activities and finances. Their indicators for progress are measured by the number of children they can help, the number of qualified foster parents they can recruit, and the devotion of their volunteers. Musings from Dr. D

I am fond of saying, "I like myself the most when I'm accompanying congregational hymn-singing." In his preface to *Hymnal Studies Five; A Liturgical Index to The Hymnal 1982*, The Rev. Dr. Marion Hatchett says,

"One of the most important parts of the planning and preparation for any service is the choice of hymns. Hymns are one of the most vital elements in the participation of the congregation. Hymns set the mood for the rite. Hymns provide a congregational response to lessons and sermons and other important elements in the rites. Hymns are the people's take-home package.

Because of the musical association people commit hymns to memory more easily and readily than prayers or psalms or other scriptural passages; therefore, the texts of hymns are more likely to recur to people than other texts – People's theology is probably influenced more by the hymns they sing than by the lessons and sermons they hear or the prayers they pray."

In planning for the music for our worship together the hymns are always selected first, using the suggested hymns for each Sunday found in Liturgical Music for the Revised Common Lectionary. Sometimes we sing hymns "In due course," i.e., simply because they are familiar and need to be sung occasionally. For example, the uber-familiar "Onward, Christian soldiers" is not recommended in Hymn Studies Five for any Sunday — many find it unacceptably militaristic — but we sing it occasionally. Look for it as the closing hymn for the first Sunday of Lent as we launch ourselves into the Forty Days of abstinence, fasting, and prayer.

After the hymns are in place then comes selections for anthems, motets, solos, instrumental music, etc., and some care is expended that these, as well, amplify and illuminate the readings and the themes of the day. The threads that unite what we do liturgically are not always apparent; some are much more subtle. Do you ever ask yourself "Why?" ...did we sing that? ...listen to that? If you do, then it is just one more way in which you enter more deeply into the worship life of the parish. Blessed are they who think and listen, as theirs will be great rewards of spirit. - Jerry Davidson

Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)

Getting close to April 15, Tax Time. A perfect time to consider using your IRA to pledge to St. John's. If a person is old enough and possesses an IRA or some other tax-deferred account, he or she should be able to realize some tax-saving benefits by donating to St. John's, using a "qualified charitable distribution" referred to as an RMD. If you are required to withdraw a percentage of your tax-deferred accounts and pay taxes on that withdrawal avoid paying taxes on that required annual withdrawal by donating to St. John's. Your financial advisor can explain the details.

St. John's Endowment Fund

The fund is intended to be managed in perpetuity, meaning the principal will not be invaded. You may want to consider making a gift to the endowment fund as a direct gift of cash or as a planned gift. Consult your financial manager about gifts to the endowment fund to possibly reduce your taxes. Endowment Fund brochures are available in the parish hall.

St. John's Annual Parish Meeting Notes

The St. John's annual Parish Meeting was held Sunday, January 26, 2025 in the Parish Hall and remotely on Zoom. Approximately 40 people were in attendance. The Vestry members will remain active until after a new rector is in place. Reports given by the Wardens. Treasurer Keith Salmon, assisted by Andy Weeks, presented a review of the 2024 financials and the 2025 budget. The budget is based on 3 months of an interim rector and 6 months of a full-time rector. Hard copy of the presentation was made available to participants. In summary:

- 2024 Revenue _ \$254,417
- 2024 Expenditures _ \$204,765
- 2024 Surplus _ \$49,652
- 2024 Cash on Hand _ \$169,283
- 2024 Outreach Collections/Distributions _ \$9,786

The 2025 Budget presentation consisted of Budget versus 2024 Actual, including variance. In summary:

- 2025 Budget Revenue _ \$251,000
- 2025 Budget Expenditures _ \$245,000
- 2025 Budget Surplus/Deficit \$6,000 Surplus

Dr. Jerry Davidson presented the report from Diocesan convention, Jamie Hamilton presented the Search Committee report, and The Rev. Susan Davidson presented the Rector's Report. - Katie Wilson.

Vestry Notes

Vestry approved Minutes are now posted on the bulletin board in the parish hall.

November 21

Treasurer's Report: \$15,000 surplus shown at the end of October. The surplus started accumulating in July when Fr. Eric retired. We are paying property tax on the gazebo which Keith believes is new this year.

Senior Warden Report: Kitchen door has been replaced. Andy Weeks will design a card with information for Christmas services. Wavecrest, without consent installed new door and purchased a new air conditioner at a cost of \$800. Keith sent a letter to Wavecrest advising correct procedure.

Rector's Report: The bishop's visit rescheduled due to Bishop Dabney Smith's death.

Rector Search Update: The Search Committee is consolidating the responses from the church meeting. Vestry will review. A Farmers' Market in the park suggested to introduce people to St. John's. The Vestry approved.

Vestry Notes (cont.)

December 19:

Treasurer: Presented a draft of the 2025 budget. The Vestry requested clarification of the 2024 budgeted items for the Organ Scholar and Supply Organist. The Diocesan pledge will increase 11-12% in the 2025 budget. Rent for the Shady Lane property will increase beginning in March.

Stewardship: 41 pledges received, \$170,092 pledged vs. \$150,836 for 2024.

Senior Warden: Wavecrest-electrical panel replaced to meet commercial standards. Clean-up work continues slowly. Original Parish Register discovered and will be protected.

Junior Warden: Replaced A/C unit and made repairs at rental properties.

Rector's Report: Ben and Jerry Davidson have volunteered as delegates at the Diocesan Convention and Katie will be the alternate. The Vestry will vote on the delegates after the service on January 5th. Angie Brown's funeral, December 28. Burial in the Memorial Garden. Annual Meeting – January 26, 2025.

Rector Search Update: All inputs received from the committee members and congregants over the last few months will be formalized and the responses forwarded to Canon Dan. The committee will then wait the response of the Diocese.
