The Lessons All sit

Exodus 3:1-15

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." When the Lord saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." He said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face,

for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the Lord said, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey, to the country of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. The cry of the Israelites has now come to me; I have also seen how the Egyptians oppress them. So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt." But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" He said, "I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain."

But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I am who I am." He said further, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'I am

Ido not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness.

Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. These things

happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let

you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.



The Breaking of the Bread

Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; *Therefore let us keep the feast.*

The Holy Eucharist is Christ's eternal banquet, to which all adults and children are invited. If you are a baptized Christian of any tradition (and regardless of your current status in any other church) we welcome you to receive communion with this community of God's people. At the time of communion, the ushers will indicate when your row should come forward. Please come to the altar rail; you may stand or kneel. The bread will be placed in your outstretched hands; the appropriate response is "Amen." When the chalice of wine comes, hold out your bread for the minister to dip it in the wine for you, or decline it by crossing your arms over your chest. If for any reason you prefer not to receive the bread and wine, or if you have not been Baptized, you may come forward and cross your arms over your chest for a blessing.



THIS MORNING'S MUSIC

In Psalm 80:8-16 Israel is "the vine brought out of Egypt" which flourishes but is eventually ravaged. In the parable of the vineyard found in Isaiah 5:1-7 (the source for most of the Vinea mea electa text), the "vineyard" is "the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are the plant of his pleasures." Jeremiah 2:21 echoes: "Yet I had planted thee a noble vine, wholly a right seed: how then art thou turned into the degenerate plant of a strange vine unto me?"

The unknown author of the *Vinea mea electa* text extends the metaphor into a New Testament context, asking not why the "chosen vine" was ravaged or brought forth the "wild grapes" of transgression, but how God's chosen Israel could become so embittered that they would be capable of crucifying Christ and freeing the thief Barabbas.

In its ancient liturgical context *Vinea mea electa* appears during the First Nocturn of Matins on Good Friday as a Responsory to the third Lesson from the third chapter of the *Lamentations of Jeremiah* which ends with the words:

"He had built against me round about, that I may not get out: he hath made my fetters heavy. Yea, and when I cry, and entreat, he hath shut out my prayer. He hath shut up my ways with square stones, he hath turned my paths upside down." (Lamentations 3:7-9) (from *Translations and Annotations of Choral Repertoire* compiled and annotated by Ron Jeffers)

Dr. D's "Jesus, Lord" is composed in the style and intent of a hymn from the Taizé community. The point of these pieces is that they are sufficiently short and easy so that every member of the worshiping congregation can participate. The continual repetitions allow us to let the text and music flow deeply into our subconscious to draw us nearer to the mind and heart of God. Even if you think you don't sing, simply repeating the text – either in Latin or English – lets you be a real part of this worship experience, whether in your pew, at the rail, or going in between.

If we could get our hands on one of Harry Potter's magic wands we would wave it in such a way as to cause every worshiper to join with the choir in singing these Taizé pieces during the Distribution. These brief, introspective snippets of music are just about the perfect way to continue our participation. Even if you think you "don't sing" you could at least murmur the words in rhythm - it'll accomplish the same goal: quieting your inner voices and opening you up to the reception of the Holy Spirit.

"The glory of these forty days" was written by St. Gregory the Great (c.540-604) and translated

for us by Maurice F. Bell (1862-1947). This great Latin hymn Clarum decus jejunii is a hymn for the opening of the Lenten season, a reminder of the necessity for fasting and prayer as exemplified by Moses, Elijah, Daniel and John the Baptist. (from *Hymn Notes* by Austin Lovelace)




